Real Science in the CES Garden

When CES Science Coordinator Amy Bogaard noticed one of the school garden beds falling apart, she looked beyond the collapsing bricks and oozing soil and saw an opportunity to bring real science to the students.

A decade after it was created, the Pizza Bed, so-named due to its annual crop of pizza vegetables and herbs, needed a complete

renovation. Complicating the project was the fact that the Pizza Bed lies on a slant, but the soil and bricks needed to be level. Bogaard knew she could count on the students of Chautauqua to find the answer while having some fun with real science.

"Bringing science into the classrooms is great." Said Bogaard. "Especially when the classroom is outdoors and problem is genuine!"

Bogaard enlisted the help of Karen Barich's 4th Grade class and the Pizza Bed Project was born. Using classroom instruction and hands-on experimentation, the students were given a chance to design a way to level the ground, lay the bricks and bring the Pizza Bed back to its original condition.
